

Preface

This monograph was completed under the auspices of Africa Peace Forum (APFO) and is a product of a collaborative effort of many people and institutions working in the field of arms management in Africa. I am, however, solely responsible for the choice of methodology and the development of concepts and for identifying the key commitments to be examined and the indicators against which implementation of these commitments would be measured.

APFO, a Nairobi-based non-governmental organisation, is a core partner of the African Human Security Initiative (AHSI), which is a network of seven African civil society organisations that have undertaken the task of assessing compliance with numerous commitments made by African governments at the level of OAU/AU.
